
Early Arrival / Late Pick up

News from Studio 9

In Studio 9, we have been diligently practising our daily TENS (Targeting Emerging Numeracy Skills) sessions, with the primary goal of developing automaticity and speed in our foundational number skills. During weeks 3, 4, and 5, we familiarised ourselves with the game and concentrated on refreshing ourselves with the three major operations. As we move into week 6, our focus shifts to increasing the levels of difficulty in addition. We are employing strategies such as rainbow facts, friendly numbers, and near doubles to enhance our skills.

We have the autonomy to utilise various resources, including whiteboards and hundred charts, to support our learning. We use playing cards as a tool for the game, with difficulty determined by the number of cards and their placement in specific place values.

To foster a competitive spirit, we challenge each other and engage in self-reflection at the end of each session, assessing whether the level was "challenging," "just right," or "not challenging enough." Recently, we've added a quick game of "Around the World" to conclude our TENS sessions, further enhancing our numeracy skills.









A3 News

This term A3 have been focusing on the secret power, Team Player.

We have collaborated with our buddies from Casey's class to decorate the asphalt with chalk drawings.

We have worked hard to prepare our Secret Garden to a learning space by trimming the banana tree and moving these branches to the nature play. We have also worked in teams to make shared pots where we hope to grow seasonal vegetables soon.

The focus that Prospect North Primary School has on oracy (oral language development) and on the creation and embedding of quality media content has played out in the media in multiple ways this week.





The start of 2025 was spent focusing on building our wellbeing strategies. This included unpacking the School Values, looking at the SECRET Powers, and in particular being a SELF MANAGER. We also spent time learning about the LEARNING PIT, and strategies we can use to help us when we are faced with a challenge or need to build our resilience,



Math

We started the year looking at the the mathematical dispositions, and how to be good mathematicians. We spent time learning to theorise and justify our thinking and the strategies we use when we do that. We have also unpacked pattern families, sorting them under the different headings. Now we are starting to look at calculating strategies.

Personal Investigations

We have also started our individual Personal Investigation projects. We have spent some time in the immersion phase, becoming curious and developing our sense of wonder about a range of topics. We have added these to our Wonder Wall and have started our Mindmaps on Canva.













The start of this year was also about setting up routines around building our recalling facts in math. Each morning we spend time individually practising our recalling facts.


When we feel confident, we complete an audit. We also play math card games to help build our fluency, understanding and retention of the facts.

Some News from Rooms A3 & A4

Trying Foods We Have Grown: In the garden students get the opportunity to grow and harvest many foods. As part of our morning we often pick foods and encourage students to try them. Many students love to do this and some are more cautious. Our minimum level of engagement is to touch and smell it, next is a nibble and most kids are happy just to give it a go and eat it. Students have eaten bananas, tomatoes and beans and this week we tried our pomegranates. The students let us know that in Hindi pomegranates are called anaar and in Sanskrit, daadim.



We are investigating signs: Students are in the immersion phase of investigating signs. Students have walked around the school and performed a sign audit and we have collected other pictures of signs. They have brainstormed what signs have and what do signs tell us. Students are beginning to design their own signs and we hope to go on an excursion to see signs made too.
