World Autism Awareness Day

- World Autism Awareness Day is a day sanctioned by the United Nations (UN) that recognises and celebrates the rights of people on the autism spectrum. The United Nations General Assembly, in 2008, unanimously declared 2 April as World Autism Awareness Day as a way to highlight the need to help improve the quality of life of people with autism so they can lead full and meaningful lives as an integral part of society.
- This year, Autism Spectrum Australia (Aspect) asked the Autistic community what they would like people to know if they find out that a person is Autistic. The most important message is that no two Autistic people are the same and that autism may not be what you think it is. It's not a one-size-fits all approach and there is so much misunderstanding out in the public. Fitting in can be exhausting. The environment and people's attitudes can often be more of a barrier for people on the autism spectrum. Each person on the autism spectrum is an individual with unique qualities, strengths and support needs.

What's Been Happening in A3 and A4?

Shared Pot Project: Students in A4 have worked with a partner in A3 to choose two types of vegetable seeds and two types of flower seeds to plant into their own large pot. Many of the seeds have already germinated and students are tending to their plants daily.



INVESTIGATIONS: Students have used bamboo skewers, plastic straws, milk bottle tops, cardboard ... to design and make vehicles with wheels that spin. They received feedback (what's good) and feedforward (what they might like to consider) to improve their vehicle.
