Maths: Geometry



In Maths this term, we have started our learning in the Geometry draw – focusing on shape! We learnt how to classify shapes by their dimensions and we went on a Spatial Hunt in our classrooms! We are learning how shapes fit together by packing, where they cover a space without overlapping. We used tangrams to explore this and the QR code is an app we enjoyed using! Next we will be exploring how shapes can stack and also learning how shapes move (transformations).





Room 8 News

In Room 8, we have been developing our creative and critical thinking skills, and mathematical vocabulary through investigations and class discussions. Recently, we learnt about the evolution of money and its different forms. We were fascinating to know how the story of money started from simply exchanging goods, to using shells then gold followed by notes and coins to now people using credit cards and debit cards. To consolidate our understanding, we sorted out different forms of money into different categories and shared our knowledge and thinking about different forms of money and their usage with our group.



We are launching our new **Student Designed Staff T-shirts!**

Below is our brand new PNPS Staff t-shirt designed by our students, and we are delighted with the results!

This was a proud collaboration between our First Nations and non-Indigenous students and the t-shirts are ready to be worn in Reconciliation Week 2023, which officially begins this Saturday.



Most of the designing was completed by our First Nations students for their 'Paint and Chat' tshirt. The front remains the same with the word STAFF added. Elements of the environment are
depicted on the front, including rivers, and the sun-the constant re-newer of life. The colourful
dot sleeve acknowledges our First Nations Peoples as having the longest, continuing art
traditions in the world. The other sleeve symbolises the homes of the students attending our
school.

Non-Indigenous students spent time completing some fine art drawings of thistles which is our school emblem. The school was named after Blair Atholl in Scotland, so this scotch thistle was made the emblem. The school colours have always been purple and green.

Many amazing drawings were presented! After much consideration, the double thistle on the right by Katherine Zbik was chosen as well as the single thistle on the left drawn by Holly Kennedy. Congratulations to those girls and all other students who took part in this drawing activity. You can see that the Kaurna shield is centrally placed on the back of the t-shirt which is a powerful symbol of Kaurna identity. The Sturt's desert Pea is the floral emblem of SA, and the golden wattle is native to the Adelaide region. We are also proud to have our school values of Curiosity, Compassion, Creativity and Resilience written on our T-shirts.

Together we will achieve on Kaurna Land.






